Comparative Literature (commonly abbreviated as "Comp. Lit.") offers students the opportunity to pursue their love of literature beyond national & disciplinary boundaries. It situates the study of literature in a 21st century global context that takes account of cultural & linguistic diversity as well as changing technologies & new media. Majors study literary texts in at least one language other than English, delving into works from the ancient as well as the modern world, & exploring cultural productions from non-Western traditions as well as the so-called "great books" of the West. Students study literature's intersections with other...



... media & disciplines such as philosophy, religion, history, law, film studies, & psychoanalysis, & take courses in areas as varied as fantasy, science fiction, & anime; Shakespeare in Russian culture; the politics of emotion; global feminist literature; visual culture in the Americas; history & memory; psychoanalysis & law; & postcolonial theory. Our courses engage fundamental questions integral to the contemporary humanities: How do we define "human" & what rights do we attach to this concept? How does language function & what are its limits? How do ethics, politics, & religion understand justice differently? How does memory shape our view of history? How do different communication technologies affect us? Why does aesthetic form matter?



The department offers regular opportunities to experience the pleasure of a diverse & vibrant intellectual community. Our Open House kicks off the semester with friendly conversation, providing a social & intellectual environment for students and faculty, while enjoying pastries & refreshments. The annual *Undergraduate Colloqui*um reflects the wide-ranging & innovative scholarly work produced by our majors. Featuring a selection of the best papers written in Comp Lit courses in a given year, & judged by a panel of faculty & graduate students, it offers undergraduate students an opportunity for the highest level of professional recognition in their field.






